Oprah's tea to aid Bowman

GARY - An unexpected gift from Oprah Winfrey has given Thea Bowman Leadership Academy officials and students who are in the Pathways to College program reason to celebrate.

Winfrey recently announced that Pathways to College, an after-school program that aims to help students in struggling school districts get to college and earn degrees, will be among the organizations to benefit from sales of her new tea, according to Starbucks' website and Pathways to College president and founder Judith Griffin.

During Starbucks' annual shareholders meeting last month in Seattle, Winfrey acknowledged the national success of Pathways to Col-

Pathways to College is one of four nonprofits supporting urban education that will benefit from contributions from

"This will allow us to do more of what we are already doing," Griffin

She said that each year 100 percent of students involved in Pathways to College receive at least one college acceptance letter. Together, these students earn \$2 million to \$4 million in scholarships.

Up to 100 Pathway scholars are selected at high schools in struggling districts, and they are mentored by three to five teachers after school. Schools usually pay \$120,000 to Pathways to College to offset expenses that include taking students on tours of college campuses. But with a limited budget, the administration of Thea Bowman and Pathways to College agreed to a program with 30 students.

"The goal is to go into school districts that do not have a lot of resources," Griffin said. "Systemic change is possible, and high school is not too late to start."

Pathways to College previously offered its services to Gary Community Schools Corp. under its previous administration but was turned

down by the school board.

Gary Community Schools Corp. Supt. Cheryl Pruitt said she is revisiting the budget with hopes to offer public school students the same advantages as Thea Bowman, a charter school, to prepare them for college. The board has two new members, and Pruitt and Griffin have talked about a second chance at board approval for the program.

Meanwhile, Thea Bowman students are positioned for success.

The Pathways to College curriculum creates a network of peers who encourage and inspire one another to succeed, officials said.

"The fastest way to change a school is to get the students to do it," Pathways senior advisor Gregory Prince said. "Reform in America is usually top-down; we have a bottom-up program."

Pathway scholars are expected to change the atmosphere the entire school. Prince said students are eager to be part of the process.

Gary Mayor Karen Freeman-Wilson welcomes Winfrey's support.

"We are beyond excited that Ms. Winfrey has pledged her support to a program that will directly impact youth in Gary, We will continue to work on Gary's revitalization every day," said Freeman-Wilson, also hopeful after President Barack Obama made Gary a "promise zone" to help the community fight poverty and assist children.

Winfrey is a longtime supporter of Pathways to College, having also made possible the publication "Pathways to College: An Explorer's Guide." The college preparation guidebook is helping Thea Bowman's Pathway scholars prepare for a world of unlimited possibilities.

"The proceeds from Oprah Chai Tea will give us another great opportunity," Griffin said.
